Within Nebojsa Bezanic's art of painting, everything starts and ends with a drawing. As one of the best European drawers, he has expanded human anthill with his drawing, and spread it over his own map of the world, which has neither beginning nor end. He includes countless figures in his map of the parallel world, small and big soldiers waging war for him. The painter is like the demiurge, God of one of numerous universes where human is given the significance different from the real one. The artist is no traditional minos, but the creator of the world, which operates according to its own rules, in agreement with space and fictitious time, which is lived faster and more existing.

Bezanic's work has been exhibited solo in Barcelona, Brussels, Cacak, Luxembourg and Paris as well as in group shows in France and abroad. He has been awarded twice the prize Dragan Cirkovic in Cacak both in 1985 and 1989. His work is present in private collections such as the *Institut culturel Bernard Magrez* (Bordeaux), and Edric Van Vredenburgh (London). His work can also part of the permanent collection of the *Musée de l'Erotisme* in Paris. In 2013 Bežanić was awarded by the Taylor foundation the Claire Combes prize.
